Fr. Anthony completes his St. Joseph's season with many victories — big and small. Under his tenure as chaplain, many wondrous things were accomplished.

2013: The Medicine Wheel Garden opened at the Aktá Lakota Museum & Cultural Center.

2015: St. Joseph's high school senior home opened, and a new playground was constructed on campus.

2017: The new Health and Family Services Center opened on campus.

2019: Construction broke ground on the Sacred Heart Family Safe Shelter, a domestic violence shelter on the Cheyenne River Indian Reservation.

2020: The Coronavirus pandemic began, but Fr. Anthony was determined to continue Mass and Prayer Services. Services went virtual, with students,

2021: Construction broke ground on the Equine Therapy Complex on St. Joseph's campus.
