The following is a highlight reel including some of our favorite moments of 2022. We're heading into 2023 very thankful, as all of these events and more were possible thanks to the kindness of people like YOU!

January 2022

• Students returned from winter break and took part in Christmas parties within their campus homes. It's the most joyful way to begin the new calendar year.

February 2022

 St. Joseph's Indian School awarded a total of \$186,285 in college scholarships to Native American students pursuing higher education.

March 2022

- The gymnastics, wrestling and basketball seasons wrapped-up. Each activity helped students learn the skills of teamwork, endurance and leadership.
- St. Joseph's hosted an Archery Challenge. Overall, 26 students in grades 4-12 participated in the weekend competition.

April 2022

- St. Joseph's Indian School received the "Top-Rated Nonprofit" award from GreatNonprofits for the sixth consecutive year.
- Confirmation, Baptism and First Communion took place for 17 students with their families in attendance.

May 2022

- Seventh grade students went on the annual Cultural Trip to sacred sites of their ancestors.
- Fourteen eighth grade students and six senior students graduated.

June 2022

• Rising Eagle Day Camp returned! Total attendance this year was 730 with over 3,100 miles traveled and over 2,100 meals and snacks provided.


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July 2022

• The Bookmobile outreach program safely delivered 18,518 books to nearly 1,500 people in reservation communities.

August 2022

- The new 2022-23 school year began.
- Our Rec Center hosted a triathlon for students and children from the broader community.

September 2022

• We hosted our 46th Annual Powwow, open to the public once again! It was a weekend of cultural activities, campus tours, the Equine Therapy Center dedication, powwow competition and more!

October 2022

- Students celebrated Native American Day by focusing on their traditions, heritage and stories.
- The school celebrated Red Ribbon Week by decorating campus trees with red ribbons.

November 2022

- Students celebrated Native American Heritage Month. Although already a primary focus, students took even more time learning about the Lakota culture all month long.
- Students participated in Rock Your Mocs to celebrate and embrace their culture.

December 2022

• Students selected presents for their siblings, parents/guardians and grandparents from our campus Christmas Store.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Lakota people marked the beginning of the next year in the spring, not the winter. Though calendar types vary from tribe to tribe, nearly all tribal calendars begin in the spring. To the Native American people, spring symbolizes the start of a new year through the birth of new plant and animal life.
